All Saints' Sunday

All Saints' Day is one of the seven Principal Feasts of the Church Year. It occurs annually on November 1 but may be observed the following Sunday, as is our custom at St. John's. On this day, we celebrate the glorious company of all the saints, commemorating those noble souls who have given us an example of righteousness and have been the lights of the world in their generations.

Saints' Shields

Centuries ago, artists of the Church began to create coats of arms representing the saints, using the 12th century artistic rules and symbolism of heraldry. Today our sanctuary is decorated with shields representing numerous saints from across the ages. Each shield tells a story.

All Souls Service – 4 p.m. Today

All Souls is typically observed on Nov. 2; we will observe it later today as an extension of our Allhallowtide services.




A Reading from the letter of Paul to the Ephesians

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

Thanksgiving over the Water

The Celebrant blesses the water, first saying

The Lord be with you.

And also with you. People

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise. People

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

At the following words, the Celebrant touches the water

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Each candidate is presented by name to the Celebrant, or to an assisting priest or deacon, who then immerses, or pours water upon, the candidate, saying

N., I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Then the Priest places a hand on the person's head, marking on the forehead the sign of the cross and saying to each one:

N., you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. Amen.

When this action has been completed for all candidates, the Bishop or Priest, at a place in full sight of the congregation, prays over them, saying

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. Amen.





It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever. Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance. Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing,



The People kneel as they are able. Then the Celebrant continues

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners,

freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Celebrant and People

The Celebrant continues

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

Remember NN. and all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, with St. John the Evangelist and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. AMEN.



The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.

The Fraction Anthem



The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The Communion of the People

Communion is central to our worship at St. John's. All baptized Christians—regardless of age or denominational affiliation—are welcome to receive.

1 Wait for guidance from the ushers.

At the appropriate time, an usher will invite the people in your pew to rise and follow the line to the Communion rail or station. Those with limited mobility may request that Communion be brought directly to their pew.

2 Kneel or stand.

Most people kneel at the rail to receive Communion, but standing is also appropriate, especially if kneeling is difficult.



3 Receive the Bread.

As the minister approaches with the Bread, extend your hands with palms open and facing up. You may consume the Bread immediately or wait to have it dipped in the Wine.

4 Receive the wine.

The Wine is served in a large chalice as a sign of unity. Assist the lay minister by guiding the chalice to your lips, holding it by the base, and take a small sip. If you would rather not drink directly from the chalice, you may offer your Bread to the lay minister and allow him or her to dip it in the Wine and hand it back to you to consume.



5 Return to your pew.

Return to your pew, kneel if you like, sing with the congregation, or offer your silent prayers to God.

If you are unbaptized or would prefer not to receive the bread or wine for any reason, cross your arms over your chest at the rail. This signifies to the priest that you wish to receive a blessing instead.





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About the Shields of the Saints

Centuries ago, artists of the Church began to create coats of arms representing the saints, using the twelfth-century art and symbolism of heraldry. Today our sanctuary is decorated with shields representing numerous saints from across the ages, painted in 2024 by members of the parish.

Each shield tells a story of courage, sacrifice, and faith. The background colors themselves carry meaning: **red** often signifies the blood of martyrs and the fervor of apostles; **blue** evokes heavenly truth and divine contemplation; **gold** represents glory, virtue, and the light of Christ; **silver (white)** stands for purity and joy; **green** conveys hope and new life; **black** speaks of humility and mystery; and **purple** reflects penitence and royal devotion.

As we walk down the aisle to receive Communion today, with the saints' shields surrounding us on every side, we are reminded that we do not walk alone. We are encompassed by that great cloud of witnesses: men and women who, in their own times and ways, bore the light of Christ into the world. Below are explanations behind just a few of our many shields.



St. Ambrose – 4th century: The scourges represent the strict discipline of the Bishop of Milan. His eloquence, courage, and advocacy for justice shaped the moral and theological life of the early Church. Gold beehive, silver scourges on a blue field. Celebrated Dec. 7.



St. Catherine of Siena – 14th century: Among many diplomatic achievements, St. Catherine is known for effecting a reconciliation between Florence and the Papacy. Her intense love for Christ and vision of divine mercy inspired her reforming zeal. A red cross, gold heart, on a black field. Celebrated Apr. 29.



St. Columba – 6th century: Founder of the island sanctuary of Iona, who, with his monks, evangelized Scotland and northern England. Columba's poetic spirit and prophetic heart brought the light of the Gospel to a rugged land. A blue Iona cross on a white field. Celebrated June 9.



St. Cyril of Alexandria – 5th century: Defender of the Blessed Virgin as Mother of God against the false doctrine of Nestorius. His clarity and conviction shaped the Church's understanding of Christ's full divinity and humanity. Gold pens, white scroll with black inscription, on a blue field. Celebrated June 27.



St. Francis of Assisi – 13th century: It is said that St. Francis, the father of the Franciscan Order, for two years before his death bore the marks of the Lord's Passion upon his hands, feet, and side. His joyful poverty and kinship with all creation continue to call the Church to simplicity and praise. A silver cross, red marks of the stigmata, on a brown field. Celebrated Oct. 4.



St. John Baptist – 1st century: The last of the Jewish prophets, who prepared the way for Jesus. His humility and fiery proclamation remind us that repentance opens the heart to grace. The Maltese cross of silver, on a black field. Celebrated June 24.



St. John Chrysostom – 5th century: The great Archbishop of Constantinople, renowned for his eloquence and moral courage. His preaching called for justice and purity of heart among both rich and poor. A gold chalice upon a gold book with red bookmark, on a blue field. Celebrated Jan. 27.



St. Leo of Rome – 5th century: Pope and teacher whose strength of spirit defended both the faith and the city of Rome. His sermons on the Incarnation still anchor the Church's understanding of Christ's saving work. A silver mitre with gold infulae, pickaxe with gold head and silver handle, on a blue field. St. Martha – 1st century: Remembered for her hospitality to Jesus in Bethany. She reminds us that service, when offered in faith, is itself a form of worship. A covered table with blue cloth and red fruit, all on a silver field. Celebrated July 29.



St. Mary the Virgin – 1st century: The mother of Jesus and model of joyful obedience. Her "yes" to God opened the way for the world's salvation and continues to inspire every heart that longs for grace. Gold monogram on a blue field. Celebrated Aug. 15.



St. Michael the Archangel – Eternal: Leader of the heavenly hosts and guardian of souls. His victory over the powers of darkness reminds the Church of God's promise to protect and redeem. A red cross on a silver field. Celebrated Sept. 29.



St. Nicholas of Myra – 4th century: Bishop and protector of children, remembered for his secret acts of charity. His generosity embodied the hidden kindness of Christ. Three gold roundels on a blue field. Celebrated Dec. 6.



St. Scholastica – 6th century: Sister of St. Benedict and foundress of a Benedictine convent near Monte Cassino. Her vision of the dove at her death symbolizes a soul at peace, lifted into the life of God. A white dove on a blue field. Celebrated Feb. 10.
